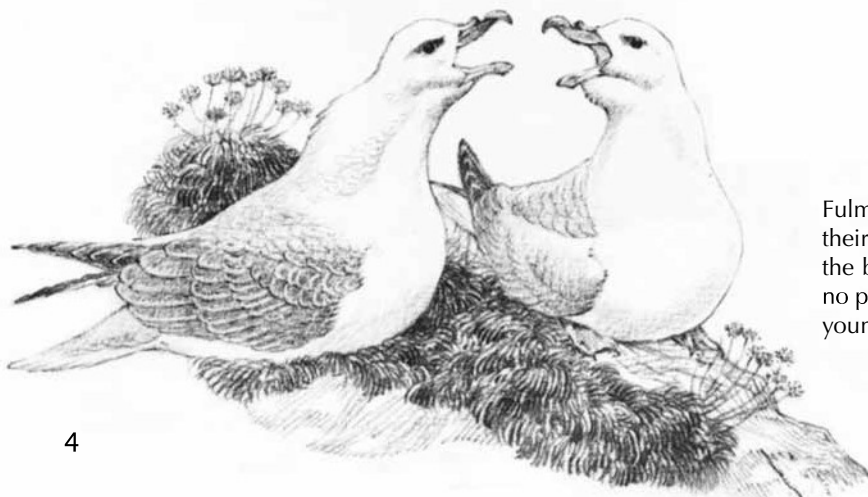


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Fulmars Flying

Heavy body, straight wings and lack of neck distinguish them from gulls. They fly in long glides on straight, slightly bowed wings, hanging on updraughts, stalling, then dropping away. The stronger the wind, the more this mini-albatross enjoys it



Fulmars are faithful to their mates and nest sites. They wave their heads, bow and cackle at mates and rivals. The inside of the bill is shown in display and is mauve or purple. There are no plumage differences with age, sex or season. At fledging the young bird resembles its parents
